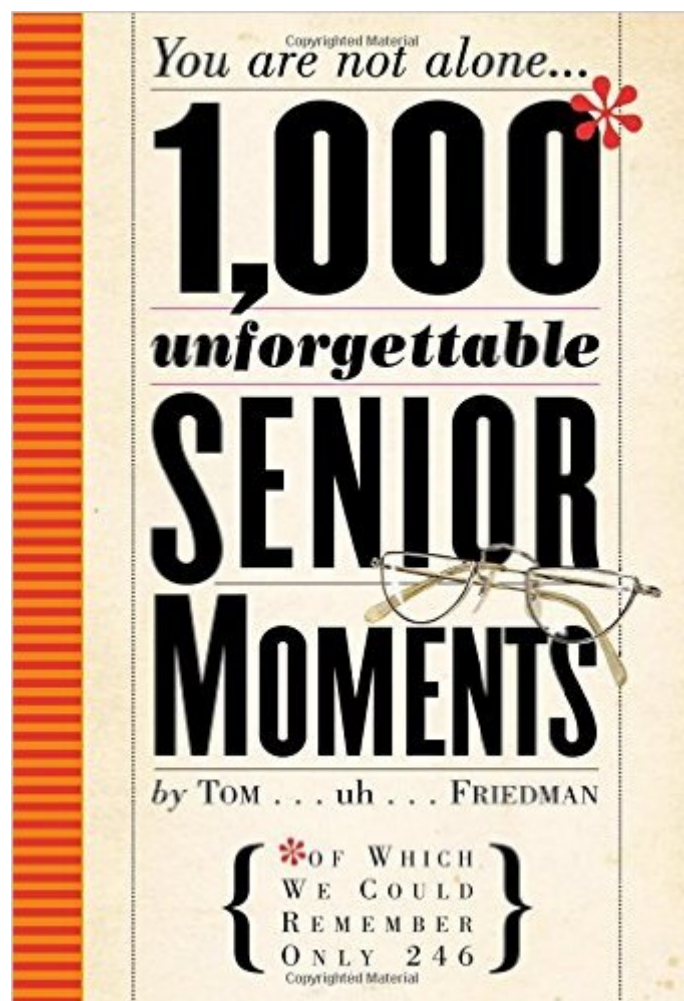

I saw this 166 page (1000 unforgettable senior moments by Tom Friedman) for a bargain price on Amazon and thought to myself "what the hell" • this book sounds interesting. I admit to thinking that this book was all about senile old geezers like me, but surprisingly, it was about all kinds of people, young and old who have had lapses of memory sometime in their lives. I suspect the whipper snapper middle aged author was trying to show that you do not have to be elderly to have mental lapses. This sometimes funny, but mostly just amusing book has numerous examples of a wide range of people who at some time in their lives had memory problems. Some examples are taken from early American history and many are from politicians from the past, as well as numerous other

famous people. Two examples of people who had problems remembering names include Chuck Berry, who called everyone "Jack" • Zsa Zsa Gabor also called everyone "Darling" • because she had trouble remembering people's names. Even writers have senior moments. Scottish writer John Campbell (1708-1775) was in a book store reading a book and enjoyed it so much he purchased it and brought it home before he realized he had written the book. Finally, even the most brilliant of people like Albert Einstein have lapses of memory. He had received an honorarium check for \$1500.00 and used it as a book marker for many months but lost the book and check. When the Rockefeller foundation sent him another check he wrote back "What's this for?" • This is a delightful and amusing book for anyone, not just seniors, who has had lapses of memory at various times.
